NATIONAL CURRICULUM

Every state-funded school must offer a curriculum which is balanced and broadly based and which:

• promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils at the school and of society

• prepares pupils at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life.

Personal, social, health and economic education

• Personal, social, health and economic (PSHE) education is an important and necessary part of all pupils' education. All schools should teach PSHE, drawing on good practice, and this expectation is outlined in the introduction to the national curriculum.

• PSHE is a non-statutory subject. To allow teachers the flexibility to deliver high quality PSHE we consider it unnecessary to provide new standardised frameworks or programmes of study. PSHE can encompass many areas of study. Teachers are best placed to understand the needs of their pupils and do not need additional central prescription.

• However, while we believe that it is for schools to tailor their local PSHE programme to reflect the needs of their pupils, we expect schools to use their PSHE education programme to equip pupils with a sound understanding of risk and with the knowledge and skills necessary to make safe and informed decisions.

• Schools should seek to use PSHE education to build, where appropriate, on the statutory content already outlined in the national curriculum, the basic school curriculum and in statutory guidance on: drug education, financial education, sex and relationship education (SRE) and the importance of physical activity and diet for a healthy lifestyle.

PSHE CURRICULUM AT ST JOSEPH'S CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL

At St Joseph's Catholic Primary School the PSHE curriculum aims to support the fulfilment of our Mission statement

"We work , learn and grow together guided by Jesus' teachings."

Teaching and learning in PSHE is an integral part of our Catholic Life, Religious Education and Collective Worship. Children are asked "Who is God calling me to be?" and encouraged to consider the type of person Jesus is calling them to be.

The Catholic Pupil Profile provides a half termly focus to guide our children to answer this question and the Principals of Catholic Social Teaching provide a moral framework of how to action this.

PSHE is cross curricular and can be taught through a variety of ways.

• It may be taught as a specific subject to teach issues such as Anti-Bullying, Internet Safety, NSPCC PANTS and Speak Out Campaigns, Drugs, Alcohol and Tobacco and SRE.

• Also through other curriculum areas such as RE, Science, PE, History/Geography, Computing, English, Maths, Art, Music, etc.

• Opportunities are also taken to extend provision including after school clubs, Residentials, Visiting speakers and presentations. SAS training, Mission, Vocations, Values and Prayer Week, Brilliant in Britain Weeks, Discipleship Week, Black History Week, Sporting activities, Outdoor learning etc.
